ABOUT GOLDEN SPACES

Golden Spaces is a free community-based program for group art exhibitions. The aim of Golden Spaces is to encourage the broader community's participation in and access to the arts in a local setting while providing professional development opportunities for emerging and established artists within the Shire.

Spanning across 3 locations, the exhibitions will be launched at the Bannockburn Cultural Centre then travel to Smythesdale to be put on display at The Well, before returning to Bannockburn to be shown at the Golden Plains Civic Centre.

There will be 2 opportunities to apply for Golden Spaces throughout the calendar year.

Each exhibition will run for 12 months, providing an opportunity for artists to exhibit their work to local and visiting audiences.

The program is designed to promote the art of local creatives and provide them with the experience of exhibiting and selling their work. As part of the exhibition program, there will be a formal launch with artist talks and an accompanying catalogue.


This is a wonderful opportunity for our established artists, and our many emerging artists yet to be acknowledged for their amazing artistic abilities.

ARTIST STATEMENT

I studied Theatre Arts whilst working in the animal sector, before moving into community services as a support worker. Rekindling my creative upbringing. I went back to study ceramics and have since been slowly exploring and developing my practice. Now working from my home studio in Ross Creek, overlooking the state forest, my work takes inspiration from my surroundings.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Edith Cattell studied the Diploma of Ceramics in 2012, and takes inspiration from her animals and environment. Her work is both sculptural and functional, and is most recently inspired by her walks in the state forest, and foraging for mushrooms on her property in Ross Creek.

FRED ROSS

ARTIST STATEMENT

With over 35 years as a furniture artisan. I have collected many odd bits of timber that have accumulated in piles which comprise small, leftover pieces, bits that don't match, offcuts and sometimes faulty, highly figured timber. These boxes, complete with their imperfections, are a celebration and exploration of various types of timbers, some of which shown here are extremely rare. Countless hours have gone into each piece, so please remember they are made of timber and in most cases finished with shellac (French polish). This means they will not tolerate extreme heat (e.g. hot cars) and over time will change and age as all natural materials do.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Fred Ross has been making solid timber furniture since 1985, inspired by the various colour and figure combinations of the world's finest furniture timbers He has extensive stocks of Australian Red Cedar, Blackwood and Mahogany, and uses veneers (often made in-house) like Flame Cedar or Fiddleback Blackwood or Bird's-eye Huon Pine or Tiger Myrtle. Often, customers choose reproduction antique styles to suit their period homes, or others want greater personal input into designs, often creating their own. There is a trend toward clean, simple lines which can easily be accommodated. A complete range of furniture can be made to order from chairs and tables to beds, bookcases, buffets or ornately carved bookcases.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY



LEANNE COUGHLAN

ARTIST STATEMENT

Living in country surrounds for most of my life has drawn me to appreciate the little but truly amazing gift that nature has to give. We just have to pause and look at what it is trying to show us. With the use of traditional methods of flower pressing, I have brought an age-old craft into the modern world. Inspired by the surrounding Australian bushland and a lovely garden for subject matter. I have created several styles. From the colours of spring, through to the rustic colours of Autumn, to the bare silhouette outlines of a leafless winter. Adding found objects and a unique 'moon' in some has brought in an extra feature of interest. When all placed on a background of natural linen fabric, my work builds a picture of simple but elegant offering from nature itself.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Inspired by nature and the intricate patterns of texture and forms, Leanne Coughlan's passion to create and present found natural items into pleasing compositions has expanded continuously for more than 20 vears. Pressing flowers led her to undertake short courses in floristry, where she began to observe and look much closer. at the delicate twists in stems and perfection in the delicacy of each petal arrangement. From this, Leanne's self-developed structural placement of seedpods. weeds and feathers needed little imagination to capture and present her engaging framed structural arrangements within chosen public domains over many past years.

LISA HUNTER

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ARTIST STATEMENT

My work is underpinned by a great curiosity about the world surrounding me, and a layered, intuitive way of expressing my creativity. Ekphrasis, the combination of image and text. and multi layered artworks are the most obvious examples of this in my work, but it is present in everything I do. Since moving to Dereel in 2012, wildflowers have featured in many of my works. We were successful in gaining Trust for Nature overlay for our property, which is rich in native flora. I work with my photographs of native orchids, lilies, and other flora to produce fabric designs, as well as digital collages for prints, and products - for example, notebook covers, cushions etc. I want to create awareness of the richness of local biodiversity and an appreciation of the beauty of tiny wildflowers most people don't even notice. This work is important to me because flowers which were common 10 years ago, are increasingly being listed as rare. Currently I am working on an ekphrastic manuscript as well as moving into hand printed fabrics.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Lisa G Hunter is a creative writer and visual artist based in Dereel. Victoria. With a professional background in Instructional Design, Lisa has always had a multi-disciplinary approach to all of her projects, including the integration of text and image. Poetry, personal essay and memoir form Lisa's creative writing pursuits, and she holds a Master of Creative Media (Creative Writing) from RMIT. Lisa is also a Certified Instructor for the self-awareness course Journal to the Self, which she runs in small aroups. Movina to Dereel in 2012 was formative in Lisa's visual arts practice. Coming from an urban lifestyle (Warrnambool, Melbourne, Central Ballarat) to a rural lifestyle gave her time to explore the bushland on her property, prompting an interest in photography. The discovery of an artistic community inspired Lisa to learn new mediums. She enjoys working with other artists. Along with other Dereel artists, Lisa's community involvement included forming Art In Dereel and receiving a grant from Golden Plains Shire to develop a year-long series of art workshops. She has also worked in committee roles with GP Arts Inc on a voluntary basis.


LUCY MCEACHERN

ARTIST STATEMENT

It was a privilege and honour to be chosen to create this bronze artwork tribute to Dr Vera Scantlebury Brown OBE and I was excited to be a founding contributor to raising the recognition and representation of women in public art across Victoria. My hope is that this project prompts greater public awareness and curiosity regarding the need for increased artistic acknowledgement of the founding women achievers in this State. Dr Vera Scantlebury Brown OBE was a renowned Australian medical practitioner in the field of pediatrics, who made her way overseas to serve on the front during World War One as 1 of 6 Australian female surgeons. She pioneered infant welfare in the state of Victoria and became the first woman appointed as the head of a state government department.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Lucy McEachern is a renowned bronze sculptor drawing inspiration from her rural Australian surroundings. Brought up in the South West of Victoria on a farming property, Lucy has developed a deep affinity with the enchanting birds that dwell in the local landscape. Lucy's tactile sculptures not only capture her subject's individual characteristics, but also invite the viewer to feel its contours in a celebration of their maiestic presence. Lucy McEachern's sculptures can be found in galleries throughout Australia and collections worldwide.

LYN LAMBETH

ARTIST STATEMENT

The techniques I use in my sculptures are informed by my life at sea - rope-work, knotting, splicing, whipping and use of wire. Extended periods at sea with limited resources needs creative solutions to the problems that inevitably arise in such a harsh environment. Making do with the materials at hand becomes a survival skill. A lifelong love of birds is reflected in my latest works, with a bird's lightweight skeletal structure and feathered outer form well suited to my medium of wire, recycled textiles and discarded fishing gear. Birds. and my representations of them, embody fragility and strength combined.



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ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Following a long career at sea as a professional fisher and marine environment advocate. in 2017 Lyn chose to pursue her interest in art, in particular mixed media sculpture using recycled materials. Based in Darwin at the time, Lyn incorporated lost and discarded fishing gear ("ghost net" and unravelled rope) collected from her local beaches or bought in by professional fishers. Art has always been a constant during Lyn's oftendiverse life and career paths and has been a counterpoint to the physical demands of fishing in northern Australia, the mental demands of finishing a marine science degree years after finishing school early, and while working with subsistence fishers in the Pacific islands. In 2021. Lyn moved from tropical Darwin to Linton and her artwork now reflects more of the local materials at hand, including wire recycled fabric and varn, eco-dyed vintage lace and rusty metal.

ARTIST STATEMENT

My art is a reflection of my deep-rooted connection with the natural world. Nature, with its myriad colours, textures and sounds, is my greatest muse. Through my paintings, I strive to capture the essence and character of the animals and birds that inspire me. I am particularly drawn to the vibrant hues and intricate patterns found in wildlife. Each stroke of my brush is a delicate attempt to convey the unique personality of my subject, whether it's the auiet dianity of a wild animal or the humour and playfulness of the birds in my backyard. I work primarily in oil on stretch canvas, striving to create a sense of movement and life in my pieces. I am constantly exploring new techniques and styles. Eager to push the boundaries of my creativity. My latest venture into colourful abstract landscapes is a testament to my evolving artistic journey and I invite you to join me as I continue to explore the boundless possibilities of art and nature.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Lyn Steele is a Bannockburnbased artist who finds her artistic expression through a blend of photography and painting, having won awards both locally and nationally. Recently, Lyn has translated her images into the vivid medium of oil painting which is deeply rooted in her connection with nature - the vibrant colours, intricate textures, soothing sounds and profound serenity that the natural world offers. Lyn's paintings, sourced from her own photography primarily featuring birds and wildlife, ensures a genuine and authentic connection to her subjects. Using oil on stretched canvas, Lyn adopts a free, expressive style, employing bold brush strokes and vivid colours to capture the essence and character of her subjects, which she is currently developing into vibrant abstract landscapes. She aims to portray the unique personalities of the animal she paints, infusing each piece with a sense of life and energy.

Painting the Kookaburra using white acrylic paint on black paper was an impulsive decision. Acrylic paint is fast drying and gives a nice textured look; it is one of my favorite mediums to use and I think the white Kookaburra stands out well on the black paper. I love how expressive art is. You can portray so many different emotions and feelings. Through my art. I want to create things that people enjoy.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Maia Draper is a young artist who lives near Scarsdale in the northern end of Golden Plains Shire. As a VCE student attending Phoenix College (Ballarat), Maia is cramming as many art-related subjects as possible into her studies, including painting. drawing, ceramics, printmaking and photography. Following completion of her VCE studies. Maia plans to take a gap year to travel locally and internationally, then return to complete a Bachelor of Fine Arts. Showing a passion for art at a young age, Maia is inspired by wild birds (particularly birds of prey) for which her preferred mediums are graphite, acrylic paint and lino printing. Maia enjoys capturing the emotions in a subject and how art can be used for selfexpression, portraying emotions, and making images of things vou really love. Her exhibition highlights include participating in the Golden Plains Arts Trail, exhibiting work at Thru The Gate Cafe (Smythesdale) as part of the Golden Plains Youth Program, and having her work selected for display at the Smythesdale Arts and Music Fiesta.

ARTIST STATEMENT

What I'm making now is a sculpture that shows how commonplace materials may be transformed into something completely new. This sculpture gains a new life as a practical piece of art made from recycled PVC pipes that would have otherwise ended up in a landfill, adding to the already alarming amount of plastic trash in the world. The organic forms I observe in nature, such as the coiled branches of trees and the insect tracks that bore into them, inform my artworks. The gum trees near my house are a great source of ideas for my sculptures, and I love to capture and imitate natural forms.



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ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Rebecca Greig is a local Ballarat abstract artist working in a mixed media style. She enjoys working with three-dimensional recycled materials to give new purpose as functional sculptures. Currently Rebecca has started an art therapeutic business in Ballarat to support other local artists with their art journey. Through her art journey she has developed a passion for teaching art to young adults and delivering a VET program in a special school setting. Rebecca studied locally at the Ballarat fine arts academy and developed a love for sculptural works, majoring in ceramics. It was through this journey she developed her sculpture skills to focus on mix media sculptures.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

Ruby Pilven is a ceramic artist who creates brilliantly coloured porcelain ceramics. Having grown up with ceramic artists for parents. Janine and Peter Pilven, Ruby has been involved in ceramics from an early age. Ruby studied a double degree in Business (Marketing) and Visual Arts (Printmaking) at Monash University. Drawing on her printmaking background, Ruby often marries her passion for printmaking and ceramics in her jewellery and ceramics work by creating layers of colour and pattern. Her work is a contemporary twist on the Japanese technique called Nerikomi, hand-building with coloured clay. This technique explores her long fascination and relationship with Japanese culture and her connection with the contemporary Australian art scene. Her work oscillates between structured techniques and chance operations.

ARTIST STATEMENT


